Armadillo Armageddon - Salford starts listening

After our successful demo ride in October it looks like Salford City Council are now more willing to hear our side of the argument. On 1st December Salford MAG activists Steve (Blayz) Blay, Mike Yarwood and Owen Morris met with Lee Evans of Transport Planning and Sally Fletcher of "Urban Vision". Councillor Roger Jones (Labour) was down to attend but gave apologies.

Who exactly are "Urban Vision", I hear you ask, and what has it got to do with them? They are, in their own words, "a multidisciplinary service organisation within the property development and regeneration sector; delivering services from pre-application planning advice through to design, comprehensive project management and scheme delivery". So, that's cleared that up then! Basically, Salford City Council (in keeping with all local government nowadays)



outsources projects such as cycle lanes to private sector groups like them. And large demo rides are not the sort of PR they like.

The MAG lads spelt out all our concerns clearly regarding the risks to motorcyclists that armadillos pose. However, it soon became apparent that the council reps had no experience of motorcycling nor had they any insight into how motorcyclists have to ride and position themselves in the road. So, the Salford MAG team explained it all patiently to them, even volunteering to take them for a "backie" so that they could discover it for themselves!



Other important points were addressed concerning how much the lanes would actually be used:

- would the cycle lanes be compulsory or just advisory for cyclists?
- how would the lanes be kept clean and free from road debris? No cyclist in their right mind is going to use them if they're full of old tyres and broken glass.
- would the lanes be wide enough for cyclists to overtake each other?

With regard to Irlam o'th Heights the council reps promised that there are no plans to build a Bedfordstyle "Turbo" roundabout but simply to slightly widen the footpaths to allow cyclists to share the pavement

rather than having to use the road. This may not be ideal but it's a lot better than what we could have been landed with! The subject of bikes in bus lanes was again pushed, with a concession gained that it was a possibility for the future, albeit not the near future but after the issue of an elected Mayor for Manchester is resolved.

No agreement was reached on the day but each side gained a clearer understanding of the other's viewpoint and the groundwork was laid for future progress. Sally Fletcher will also look into the lack of feedback received from the council after the consultation process.

So, a big thanks to Salford MAG and all those who turned out for the demo ride. We're now a step further down the road to achieving a sensible resolution, which shows what peaceful protest and tireless campaigning can achieve.

It's book time! Motorcycle book reviews by long time NW MAG member Bob Berwick

It's Christmas and those who have received gifts like old fashioned Book Tokens or maybe a Kindle could well be thinking about what motorcycle books to read over the winter. Well if it's a motorcycle travel book your choice is very large, but the motorcycle travel book to put most others in the shade is Ted Simon's "Jupiter's' Travels", first printed back in the 1970's and reprinted many a time since. It is his story of a four year. 63,000 mile trip around 54 countries on a Triumph, this book has inspired so many others to 'get up and go'. A classic book indeed, Ted Simon was himself inspired by a book called "One Man Caravan", a book about Robert Fulton's 1932/33 solo around the world trip, which I will get round to reading someday.

Ted Simon wrote a follow up book to Jupiter's' Travels called 'Riding High' where he looks back again at his 4 year journey, this time putting in some stories that there was no room for in the original book, but somehow this book is a bit sad in places as he keeps asking himself "why did I do it?" and 'has it changed me to someone I don't know?" but as the writing continues he seems to settle down and seems to accept that there were more good things to come out of 'The journey' than bad.

Years later he re-ran the journey but this time on a modern bike, a BMW, with a lot of modern aids like a computer! Again a book I have but not yet read. He also wrote "**The Gypsy in Me**", a look back at a very long walk he did late in life, from the UK to Romania no less! No motorcycles involved this time but still a good book, I read it before I attended a bike rally in Poland and it did help me to understand the Polish nation a lot better.

One very under-rated motorcycle book is "Running With The Moon" by Jonny Bealby, a book which starts off on a very sad note as his fiancé dies whilst they are travelling in Kashmir, he was 26 at the time and Melanie was a year or so younger. His recovery from his deep pain and grief gives an inspiring read, a book I will read again soon.

Also a book about African travels is **'Into Africa'** by Sam Manicom. This book I found hard to read. I know people who love all of Sam's books, but it just did not pull me into the ride.

There are lots of other motorcycle travel books which I just find hard work, like **'Full Circle'** by Richard and Mopsa English from the late 1980's which reads to me like a bus timetable with no real heart, and then there are those by Ian Mutch. I have two, "Looking For America" and "Riding With The Beast". The latter is the better of the two once you have worked out just who 'The Beast' is. Good books to slip into your panniers whilst going on a biking holiday,

The McGregor and Boorman books, "The Long Way Round" etc., often turn up cheap at charity

shops now and again and I have a few of them, none yet read by me.

Robert M Pirsig's "Zen and the Art of Motorcycle Maintenance" from 1974, been reprinted many a time, not a lot of information about either Zen or indeed motorcycles, and it is a very heavy book (and I do not mean by weight). It gets way beyond me in the second half of the book, I first tried to read it back in the late 1970's but got no more than near halfway, I picked up a near new reprinted copy this year and bit by bit I am making my way deep into it, not a book you can read in one night, but it ain't going to beat me, I will finish it one day. (*Took me 25 years!* – *Bill*)

The most inspiring book I have is "**Touching The World'** by Cathy Birchall and Bernard Smith. It is indeed an extraordinary tale as Cathy is blind and did not meet Bernard until she was in her early 40's. A short time later they do a 25,000 miles journey around the world! It is not a book you will want to put down. Cathy's writing puts you in the seat, her report, for example, about riding and staying in India sucks you into the book, as much as India sucked Cathy and Bernard into the land. There is so much in this book to take in, I am only halfway into the book at the moment but I would not lend it out to anyone, I don't want ever to lose it. The very sad thing is a few years after the book was printed Cathy died of cancer. I met Bernard at a motorcycle show some time later, very nice person.

The above is only a very small percent of the motorcycle travel writing market, there are hundreds of them so I hope you pick the good ones!! Bob B
