All new bikes to be zero emissions from 2035?

The Government's Transport Decarbonisation Plan sets out how the UK Government proposes to tackle carbon emissions from the transport sector of the economy on its path to delivering a Net Zero UK by 2050. MAG has issued its response. MAG remains opposed to compulsion as a solution to reducing carbon emissions. We have always acknowledged the need to reduce the harmful impacts of transport and this is why we have long promoted modal shift to motorcycles as a significant lever for achieving that aim. We are pleased to see the recognition of the positive and significant role played by motorcycles acknowledged in the plan, but are concerned that a technological roadmap for motorcycles has yet to be fully developed.



We call for the Plan's recognition of motorcycling's role to be applied immediately by way of a more proactive and inclusive approach to motorcycling in transport policy.

We urge the Government to listen to all voices in the forthcoming consultation which proposes the requirement for all new motorcycles and scooters being fully zero emissions at the tailpipe from 2035. Equally we want to see consideration and support for the full range of potential solutions in the technological roadmap. MAG Chair, Selina Lavender, said:

"MAG will engage with the Government and the motorcycle industry in this process and will continue to robustly represent all the opinions of its members. There is still much work to be done to ensure the benefits of motorcycling are enhanced and recognised. I am confident that MAG's engagement in this work will be positive and achieve the best possible results for motorcyclists in the UK."

Government rules out hard shoulder to cry on



Restoring the hard shoulder to the 400 miles of "smart" motorway in Britain would lead to an additional 25 deaths and 224 serious casualties per year, according to analysis by the Department for Transport. The reasoning behind this is that bringing back the hard shoulder would cut motorway capacity by a quarter, leading to greater congestion and forcing more vehicles onto less safe A and B roads. In addition, the increased congestion could cost the country £2.84 billion per year in lost productivity. These calculations have been denounced by anti-smart campaigners as "biased guesswork". CCTV cameras are not always monitored and new radar technology to detect stranded vehicles will not be fully functional until September next year.

Another nice little earner for councils

Failure to understand the meaning of a common road sign has cost bikers and drivers £14 million in London alone last year. So called "Low traffic Neighbourhoods", where only bicvcles and pedestrians are allowed, have expanded greatly during lockdown, the theory being that they will encourage locals to walk or cycle. Unfortunately non-locals are not familiar with the scheme and stray inadvertently into the restricted zones, immediately incurring a £130 fine. They are usually marked by the bike over a car sign (no access for motor vehicles), with the road often restricted by obstacles These schemes have been such as planters. criticised by police, ambulance



and fire services for making access to emergencies difficult. In November, £175 million was allocated to expand the scheme across the UK. Coming soon to a street near you? Local authorities have used emergency powers to justify fast-tracking the introduction of these schemes on the premise that they assist with social distancing. Local objections have already had an effect in causing the removal of a number of these schemes.

Please inform Lembit if you have worries about a local Low Traffic Neighbourhood. We need to act fast and clearly if there is to be a successful challenge in your locality. As we've said before, MAG is not standing against progress. We've just got issues about poorly thought-out schemes that appear to owe more to the agenda of forcing a shift to cycling and walking than they do to the transport needs of a modern economy and society.

E-scooters in Chester



Cheshire West and Chester council have launched a 12month E-scooter trial in Chester – you rent them for £2 per 20 mins. They are setting up no less than 48 E-scooter parking bays in the city. This is despite a huge increase in robberies and assaults using these things being reported and a 3 year old girl being left with serious injuries after a collision with one being ridden in a park. Meanwhile, after a complaint from reportedly just one person, the council restricted parking for real motorcycles on a section of the Groves, between the Cheshire Farm Ice Cream café and the Chester Bandstand, last year. However, bikers held a series

of peaceful protests and over 2000 people signed a petition to 'Save our motorcycle/scooter parking at The Groves', leading to a 5.5-metre length of parking space permanently reserved for motorcycles, with the adjoining 16.5-metre length reserved for motorcycles at weekends and bank holidays.
